At the end of the term we are often forced to throw out lunch boxes and drink bottles which are not collected by students and then can't be returned because they have no names.



Weekly Overviews

Over the next three years the Diocese of Maitland Newcastle is focusing on the area of contemporary learning and the effective use of data in all schools. The Diocese has engaged Lyn Sharratt, an educationalist from Canada, to work with schools over this period of time. Her most recent research informed her book *Clarity* which will be the basis of school professional learning during this time. In her book *Clarity* Lyn Sharratt emphasises fourteen parameters that are needed to improve teaching and learning in a school. One of these is the appointment of Pedagogical Mentors who will become mentors for other staff. We are fortunate to have the expertise of Kathryn Hill and Kyla Flanagan who have been appointed as Pedagogical Mentors for our school. For the rest of the year they will receive professional development on this role as well as how to support our staff to improve outcomes for our students. In alignment with our **2020 School Improvement Plan** they will focus on improving teaching and learning in writing.

As well as having Pedagogical Mentors, Lyn Sharratt's research has identified the important role that parents play in their child's education as another key parameter. To support our families involvement in their child's learning and promote meaningful conversations we are sharing weekly overviews of our learning focus areas for each class. This is done through identifying our **LEARNING INTENTIONS** in the Key Learning Areas i.e. what is the focus in that area for that week. At the top of the overview you will also see the 5 questions that parents can ask their children when engaging with them about their learning:

- 1. What did you learn today?
- 2. How did you do?
- 3. What did you do if you didn't understand?
- 4. How can you improve on your learning?
- 5. What are you most proud of?

We hope that you find these overviews helpful. Please feel free to provide any feedback to your child's teacher, Kate or myself on how you feel these overviews support you to keep in touch with your child's learning.



NEWS FROM THE PRIMARY COORDINATOR

Our classes at St Joey's are loving the implementation of VCOP. In the past two newsletters we have looked at Vocabulary and Connectives and how parents can help their children at home. This week we are focusing on Openers.



Openers

An opener is the first word or phrase used in a sentence. There are lots of different ways of opening sentences. When students start on their writing journey, most sentences initially begin with 'I, they, he/she, then'.

Older students are introduced to ISPACED openers. Here we use an acronym to remind the students to use a variety of ways to start sentences:

Running towards the sparkling sea, Megan couldn't wait to jump in!

Like a bottle- nose dolphin, she swam up and down, in and out of the waves.

Underneath the water, Megan could see a shoal of colourful fish.

Silently, she then tiptoed over to a rock pool to see if she could see a crab.

Meanwhile, Megan's parents fell asleep in the warmth of sun



How can you help?




Learning Intentions and Success Criteria

RESUMPTION OF PUBLIC MASSES

- · Having completed a COVID-19 Safety Plan, the Parish is in a position to start the celebration of Sunday Masses for a maximum of 50 people at a time from Sunday, 21 June. However, due to the highly contagious and serious nature of COVID-19, if you are elderly, unwell or have compromised health, please do not attend.
- · Because of the limit in the number of people who may be able to attend any particular Mass, all members of the Church of the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, except priests, continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass. Those who are unable to attend Sunday Mass are encouraged to keep Sunday holy through the use of the resources previously made available (and which are still available on the Diocesan website www.mn.catholic.org.au/news-events/covid-19-update).
- · Mass will be celebrated at St Mary Immaculate Church Charlestown at 8:00AM on Sunday and at St Paul's Church Gateshead at 9:30AM on Sunday. There will be no Vigil Mass because the 2 Masses on the Sunday are usually better attended and will, therefore, meet more needs. Further, the churches can only be used once a week because they must be cleaned to reduce contamination after they have been used each time.
- · From Monday of each week, and by midday Thursday, you are asked to communicate with the Parish Office, by phone (4943 4153) during business hours, if you would like to attend Mass on the following Sunday. The first 50 people who nominate for each church will be those able to attend. There cannot be an ongoing reservation because people may not be able to attend Mass every Sunday and each week others need to be given a chance of attending.
- · When you attend Mass, you will gain access to the church via the side entrance. This has the advantage of a ramp and 1 entrance will enable easier monitoring of who is attending. Upon entry, you will still need to write your name and contact phone number and then sanitise your hands. There will be no Holy Water at the entrance to reduce the danger of contamination. Near the entrance there will be baskets for the 1st and 2nd Collections. This will reduce the risk of contamination by many people handling the collection plates. Members of 1 household may gather together, but generally people will be placed allowing 4 square metres of space for each person in the building. This means that 3 people will be able to occupy a pew, separated by 1.5 metres. Every second pew will be cordoned off. You are asked to observe the 1.5 metre physical distancing before and after Mass and in the Communion line. The Precious Blood will not be distributed and the Lord's Body will only be given on the hand, not the tongue. The Sign of Peace will only be given by an acknowledging smile, nod and/or wave. There will be no Presentation of the Gifts in order to reduce the handling of items and singing will be kept to a minimum in order to reduce the volume of expelled air.
- · There are possibly other things that could be mentioned, but this will suffice. It is provided for you to be as prepared as possible for what will be a very different experience. The main thing, though, is that we can gather again for Mass and this will transcend any difficulties. Fr John and I look forward to celebrating with you.
