Dear Parents and Carers,
It has been a lovely start to Term 4 with the return of
our wonderful students and staff. Our new bathrooms
are complete and officially opened and we will now begin work
on the refurbishment of the Multi-Purpose Room. This room had extensive
treatment for mould and termite damage earlier in the year, with decontamination
and deep clean, pest treatment, new carpet, new lighting and underfloor
ventilation installed. We are now planning a complete refurbishment to upgrade
this room into a beautiful new classroom for 2021. The Catholic Schools Office will
be assisting us with the enormous cost of this project, and we look forward to the
finished product.











Last term we farewelled 2 Uni Interns, Mr Standing and Miss Griffiths who enjoyed their learning experiences in 4 Red and 3/4 Blue. I thank the staff who assisted these students during their time here, helping to form teachers of the future. This term we welcome Miss Shelley Back in 3 Red working with Miss Heather Wozniak, as she completes a bridging course from high school teaching to primary. It is always great to have others to work with and learn from in our classrooms.

We received exciting news at the end of last term that we have been successful in our application to become a "Successful Foundations" school in 2021. This project will support the positive transition of children to Kindergarten with professional learning for our staff in best practice in the area of early learning.

This week the Catholic Schools Office released revised COVID -19 guidelines from NSW Health and Catholic Schools NSW. Many things remain unchanged such as our need for restricting adults and visitors on site, so our pickup and drop off arrangements remain the same. Encouraging strict hygiene practices, extra daily cleaning and maintaining physical distancing for adults also remain unchanged.

Some good news is that we will be able to offer a revised Kinder orientation program, Yr 6 High school transitions and some excursions and incursions all with COVID Safety Plans. End of year functions will be able to go ahead at school but limited to staff and students only at this stage. This may change as the term progresses so we will keep you posted along the way.

PUPIL FREE DAY — Our final pupil free day for this year will be on MONDAY 16th November. This is a staff Faith Formation day and was postponed from Term 1 due to COVID-19. This day helps teachers attain important faith accreditation as part of their responsibilities of working in a Catholic school. Importantly, it also gives us an opportunity to pray and reflect on our own faith and spirituality.

School Fee reminders will be sent out next week. Thank you to those families who have finalised their accounts or who are making regular payments until the end of the year. If you are experiencing financial stress, please contact the office so we can sort out a suitable payment plan or alternative arrangement.

Representative sport trials are now able to go ahead this term with tennis and basketball trials back on the calendar. Please see below for further information regarding these events.

World Catholic Mission Month- Socktober

This October is World Mission Month. This year, students are encouraged to learn about Cambodia through prayer, fundraising and advocacy. The focus is on children with disabilities in Cambodia, who often do not have access to school. This is made possible through the work of Catholic Mission and the support of children and families in schools and communities such as ours. Funds have helped to establish *The Arrupe Centre* which provides support and an education to these children.

On Friday the **30th of October**, St Joseph's will be holding a Socktober- Mission Day to raise awareness and money to support children in Cambodia to access an education. Students will participate in a variety of activities such as hair braiding, colouring and also participating in a Socktober shootout. Here they will use a "sockball;" a ball made out of recycled materials such as old bags and kept together with string to try to score a goal. A sockball is often used in the game of soccer in countries such as Cambodia. Using soccer in his way, connects children to the plight of others through the universal nature of sport. Students will be able to attend in their sports uniform wearing bright and crazy socks or socks of their favourite sporting team.

We look forward to a great day where we are able to assist those in developing countries to "have life ... to the full" John 10:10.





NEWS FROM THE PRIMARY COORDINATOR



Vinnie Vocabulary: One key aspect of a child's language development is the growth of their vocabulary – the words they can understand and the words they use to communicate. Here are a few more tips to help you at home:

1 Display fascinating words

A great first step is helping children to be aware of any unfamiliar or interesting words they encounter.

2 | Create word webs

Building a word web helps children to think carefully about the meaning of a new word and how it is connected to the words they already know.

3 | Explore morphology

Morphemes are the smallest units of grammar that convey meaning. They include roots (happi), prefixes (un) and suffixes (ness). By adding them together, we can create words that carry a distinct meaning (unhappiness). Learning some of the most common morphemes can help to unlock the meaning of many different words.

4 | Collect words from reading

Learning the meaning of an individual word is trickier than you might think – so much depends on the context.

WORD OF THE WEEK

Term 4 Week 2:

Word of the Week for K-2:

Gaze

Definition: looking intently on one thing **Similar words:** stare, look, gape, goggle

Example: We love to gaze at the tropical sunset above the ocean horizon.

Term 4 Week 3:

Word of the Week for K-2:

zany

Definition: unusual but in an amusing way **Similar words:** quirky, crazy, weird, bizarre

Example: The twin sisters were always known to be a zany pair.

Term 4 Week 2:

Word of the Week for 3-6

prominent

Definition: important and well-known; easily seen **Similar words:** noticeable, conspicuous, pronounced, unmistakable **Example:** The tall girl was prominent standing among her smaller classmates.

Term 4 Week 3:

Word of the Week for 3-6

extravagant

Definition: more than is necessary; very fancy **Similar words:** excessive, showy, exorbitant, lavish

Example: I thought it was extravagant having ice sculptures at her birthday party.

SPORTS NEWS

Students in Year 4 & Year 5 have the opportunity to trial for regional and diocesan representative places in the following summer sports: basketball and tennis. Cricket & softball trials will be held separately next year.

Due to COVID regulations, parents will not be allowed to attend trials & will be asked to drop children at the venue without entering. Each of these trials will be subject to following strict COVID safe plans. Students must be talented and experienced in the chosen sport as this is only for representative trials. Tennis players MUST be able to score their own games.

The regional trials will be held early this term to progress to diocesan trials in November and further in 2021 and are only open to children in years 4 & 5. Parents must also commit to travelling with their child to further trials, if they qualify, in 2021. The Polding trials for 2021 are in Tamworth. Students will be competing against others from both classes and, where selection is close, preference tends to be given to older children.

More specific information will be sent home, dependent on the chosen sport. Regional trials will all be held at a variety of venues in Newcastle early this Term and are subject to change according to COVID restrictions. If your child would be interested in participating please let me know in which sport ASAP so that we can organise a school trial if required. Students who are successful at the school level will be given paperwork and further information as soon as it is available.


