Dear Parents and Carers,

Thank you for your wonderful support of our Catholic Care
Winter Appeal, last week. Catholic Care provide many important
services to local families and the monies raised will go to our local branch.
This week we continue to pray for our brothers and sisters around the world who
are being gravely impacted by COVID-19. We particularly pray for the people of
India as they battle the terrible effects of the pandemic in their country. May our
Lord ease the suffering and help us to show our support and compassion to those
in need.

Yesterday our staff participated in valuable professional learning with a day with Dr. Tessa Daffern, Director and Principal Education Consultant, Literacy Education Solutions, Senior Honorary Fellow, University of Wollongong. Tessa shared her research about the components of spelling and implementing explicit and systematic spelling instruction that caters for diverse learners in a classroom. Tessa then worked in our classrooms today alongside our teachers demonstrating important strategies for the explicit teaching of spelling. Research indicates that when students feel confident in spelling, their writing improves and success across all areas of literacy improves. We look forward to utilising the learnings from these days in our programs and seeing the evidence of confident spellers in their writing.

This week I met with **traffic management** consultants from Lake Macquarie Council. This was part of ongoing planning and conversations around our pickup and drop off arrangements and exit and entry points at St Joseph's. I have requested increased access for cars in the pickup and drop off points and possible relocation of the bus stop. This is a lengthy process and involves consultation with the neighbours, police and bus company. I thank you for your continued support of our current arrangements and encourage you to continue to follow the road rules when accessing our school pick up and drop off points.



Next week we will celebrate **Reconciliation Week,** focusing on National Sorry Day and

indigenous histories and culture. Our Aboriginal Education Teacher, Mrs Shaw has organised a visit by aboriginal elder, Aunty Chris who will be sharing her story of being part of the stolen generation, with Stage 3. The students will also be involved

in a variety of activities across the week, including art, videos and literature which encourages understanding, compassion and calls for further action in the future of reconciliation.

All students need to be wearing black polishable shoes Tuesday – Thursday. 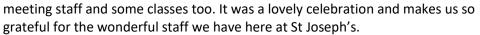


Congratulations to Mrs Ashlee Macourt and her family on the safe arrival of their baby daughter, Sabine Mary, sister for Finlay.

Professional Learning for Staff- Improving Spelling K-6

This Thursday 20th May (Pupil Free Day) staff attended a Professional Learning Day with a focus on how we can improve our professional practice in the teaching of Spelling.

The aim of the day was to look at spelling in context by using student work samples as a reference point so that student learning (in spelling) can be more personalised.

As a staff we meet regularly to discuss our students' data and growth. This year we have a continued focus on improving writing. Spelling is one aspect of improving student writing across the school.

Our teachers will have the opportunity to work together to set challenging expectations of growth for our students which is measured, tracked and supported with reflective best practice pedagogy (the way we teach). We look forward to adding more skills in our teacher toolkits and assisting our students in 'up-levelling' their work.









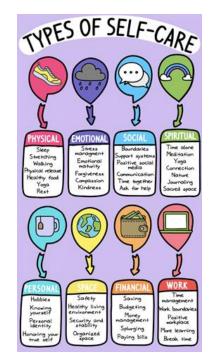

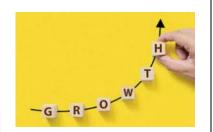

Growth Mindset:

I remember as a child hearing my parents use the saying: 'If at first you don't succeed, try, try again'. As adults we know that life is trial and error. We make mistakes along the way but (hopefully) we learn from them and we end up doing things better. We don't ordinarily throw our hands in the air and give up on our first attempt. Having a growth mindset acknowledges this. Too often, we place such high expectations on our children to succeed, to win, to be the best. Somehow, we put aside what we know is true; that there will be lots of mistakes along the way, but we learn

through these. By promoting Growth Mindsets, by encouraging the mantra 'never give up' we are teaching our children to persevere, to accept challenge as a natural part of life and learning. Whether it involves preparation for learning, developing friendships, or playing a sport, learning is enriched through error. Learning from mistakes is part of how we challenge ourselves to learn to do things differently. It motivates us to try new, innovative approaches to problem solving. Throughout a lifetime, learning from mistakes helps develop wisdom and good judgment. Here's ten ways that you as parents can help your child develop a growth mindset:

Acknowledge that you don't expect your child to be perfect. Let them know your love is unconditional, regardless of their mistakes or lapses in judgment. Don't rescue kids from their mistakes. Instead, focus on the solution. Provide examples of your own mistakes, the consequences, and how you learned from them. Encourage children to take responsibility for their mistakes and not blame others. Avoid pointing out your child's past mistakes. Instead, focus on the one at hand. Praise children for their ability to admit their mistakes. Praise children for their efforts and courage to overcome setbacks. Mentor your child on how to apologize when their mistakes have hurt others. Help kids look at the good side of getting things wrong!

Gifted Education News

Some exciting activities have been taking place in classrooms now that we are a GEL school. I have been working with children in Year 4 on maths projects. These projects present real life maths investigations that allow the children to utilise many mathematical skills while working together to achieve a solution. The boys below are trying to work out whether \$1000000 can fit in a specific suitcase. They decided to create a model to depict bundles of \$50 notes. Once they have completed this project they, and another group of students, will be investigating what their bodies are doing throughout a school day.





Other classroom activities include a focus on reading extension in Year 2. Some activities that have recently been implemented include the establishment of a student lead library, a focus on the super six comprehension strategies, reading buddies, extended success criteria, oral responses to literature and the development of ICT skills for literacy extension.





Our GEL school committee will be meeting next week to further develop classroom goals and areas for me (as the GEM) to focus on with class teachers and students.

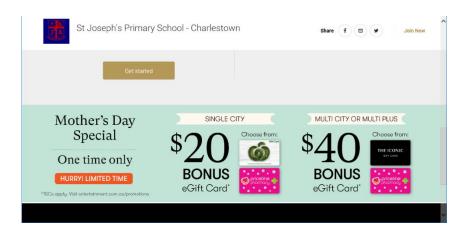

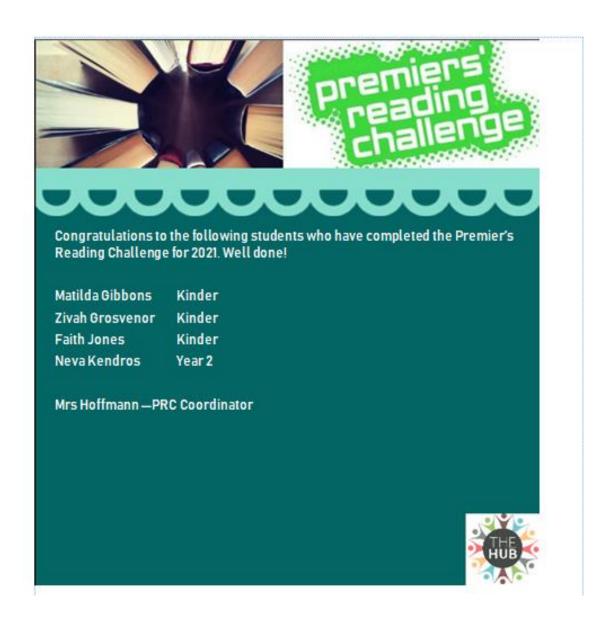

We are excited to share what we have been doing at OOSH over the past fortnight.
