
<u>A</u> focus on Learning, Collaboration & Improving Student Outcomes

Dear Parents,

A Kindness Culture at St Joseph's

One of the most important jobs as educators is to teach, model and reinforce respect, compassion, kindness and other pro-social skills. Doing so builds a school climate and culture where kids feels more connected to their teachers and one another. It leads to greater emotional health for students and teachers alike. It can also create a fundamental shift in school climate- a tipping point where bullying becomes are rarity. As research suggests, academic gains will likely follow.

You might recall completing a *Tell Them From Me* survey towards the end of 2021. Parents, Teachers and Stage 3 students were asked to participate. Our student responses indicated that they feel safe at school and their learning environment is positive. Our parent responses placed our school well above the regional mean for the way in which our school promotes and supports positive behaviours inclusivity and student safety. Teacher results overwhelming expressed the positive learning culture here at St Joey's. We have a lot to celebrate and recognise; our SJC values are authentically in action.

We ask that at home you continue to reiterate the importance of kindness over the dinner table, in the car on the way to sport and during your day- to-day conversations. Working in partnership with you is what makes our Catholic School great!

Afterall, **Kindness is contagious**- cooperative behaviour is contagious and spreads from person to person. When people benefit from kindness they "pay it forward." Only a few weeks ago I was in the drive thru-McDonald's line at Bennett's Green, (a Friday breakfast treat for my kids after early morning swimming training), the car in front not realising had jumped the queue- I smiled and waved in full understanding of the busy school morning run. When I went to pay, I was told the car in front had! What a shock, but also a fantastic opportunity to model kindness to my own children. ICAS Tests

Each year we offer our students the opportunity to participate in the world-renowned ICAS Assessments.

ICAS is designed to target students' higher order thinking and problem-solving skills in English, Mathematics, Science, Spelling and Digital Technologies. They are **challenging tests** that test skills and content beyond the standard curriculum, and are suitable for students wishing to **extend themselves academically** and take up the personal challenge of competing in an international assessment.

ICAS Assessments are now online, and this year students at SJC can participate in the following subjects:

ICAS Science Yr 2 to 6 ICAS English Yr 2 to 6 ICAS Maths Yr 2 to 6 ICAS Spelling Yr 2 to 6 The cost per test: \$19.25 including GST and the tests will be held at school during August.

Dance Fever provide experienced dance professionals to teach over 10 weeks of the term. The students will be engaged in a variety of lessons including Hip Hop, Fox Trot, Cha Cha, Contemporary, Cultural and Creative compositions. For the next 2 weeks of Term 2 we are focusing on the BEING HONEST value on our SJC PBL matrix.

Honesty can be challenging at times for children and some degree of not telling the truth is part of the developmental process. It is important to recognise this, but also look for those moments when we as adults can remind, model discuss, and reteach the value of honesty and integrity for children in various situations. It is also helpful to see honesty as not just about telling the truth but also as:

Admitting when you were wrong

Choosing not to cheat

Saying when you have had your fair share

Speaking up when something upsets you or speaking up for someone else

Saying the truth even when it not a popular or when others want it to be different

Doing the right thing- even when you didn't have to

Giving constructive feedback

Telling the whole truth, and not leaving out parts in order to hide something

Not tricking others by hiding the truth.


In class we will be talking about this focus value and teachers will be reinforcing this with positive feedback and regular prompts for our students to assist them to demonstrate this behaviour in all settings.

I am always amazed at how engaged our students are when learning about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and so proud of their empathetic nature. Some activities include bush tucker tasting, traditional Aboriginal dance lessons, Indigenous PE games, traditional smoking ceremony and watching and listening to the didgeridoo and traditional dance.

On this day in 1838 the Myall Creek Massacre occurred in NSW, and every year a Myall Creek Massacre Memorial Ceremony is held in its memory.

Aboriginal News.... For Interest Sake

Possum skin cloaks were once very important for Aboriginal people living in south-eastern Australia. People wore them to keep warm, as the weather in winter was cold and harsh. Aboriginal people also had many other uses for their cloaks. They could be used for carrying babies, as coverings at night, or for people to be buried in. They could also be used as a drum, by rolling them up tightly with the fur on the inside.

A person would wear a possum skin cloak from a young age. Six possum skins would be sewn together for a baby to be wrapped in. As the child grew, more skins would be added to the cloak, and it would continue to be worn and become a part of that person's life. Images could be added to the cloak by making cuts in the skin and painting them with ochre (a natural clay from the earth). The images were about the owner's clan and Country. Around 40 to 70 possum skins could be used to make an adult cloak.
