

Dear Parents and Carers,





Last week we welcomed three new students to St Joey's. Ava in Kinder, Evie in Year 1 and Jacob in Year 5. We hope the Kentish family and Cornish family find us to be a welcoming, inclusive and faith filled community.

Deepest sympathy to the Moore family on the loss of Chloe and Claudia's Great Grandmother and to the Boulton family on the loss of Daniel and Emily's Great Grandmother. We pray that your loving memories will bring you comfort at this sad time.



Over the last few weeks we have had incidents of graffiti in our new toilets. Silly symbols and some name marking on doors and walls. I am very disappointed with this behaviour as it shows careless disrespect for our environment and our property. I am certain that our students would not appreciate other people doing this to their homes or to their property. Students will face consequences of community service, a meeting with parents, cleaning the walls and time off the playground if found to be doing this. Please speak with your children about this topic and encourage them to speak up if they know anything about it.

Due to the break ins the school had during the January holidays we have had a number of security cameras installed. I have also increased these numbers to ensure safety on the middle playground and toilet block area. Please be aware when you are onsite that cameras are installed on most buildings now.

Our building works are continuing to progress smoothly. I can now happily announce the CSO have approved to completely re roof the classrooms with colour bond roofing while under construction and the old windows will also be replaced. This is an addition to the original approval of major refurbishment of the internal structure of the classrooms: Kinder, Year 1, Multipurpose Room and Year3/4 unit. All classrooms will be reroofed in this maintenance project. These new features will certainly add another layer of improvement to our buildings!

Recently I met with a landscape architect to design the middle play space where our new play structure will be installed. Thanks to the NSW Government Community Partnerships grant a fort/climbing structure will be built and with the help of the P&F and school funds new retaining walls, softfall and shade sails will also be installed. The design process will look at including other features as well and these will be added over time with further funding support. We are looking forward to seeing this project started in the next few months.

Semester 1 reports will be published to parents on Friday afternoon in Compass. They will be a revised format with the Religion, English and Mathematics teacher comment offering two areas of strength and an area for development. The area for development can form a learning goal for your child. If you would like to organise a meeting with your child's teacher to discuss the report in more detail, please make contact with them via email.




Don't Be an Audience.





If you believe your child does have the maturity to use social media, still supervise their behaviour by ensuring they use their device in a public space and that they allow you to access their accounts.



Aboriginal Education

Year 1 and Year 2 students recently spent an amazing morning with Kentan from Bahtabah Local Aboriginal Land Council. Kentan is a wealth of knowledge and shared so much interesting information through hands-on learning with our classes.

The students loved learning about the traditional uses of tools and weapons. It was so fascinating to learn the ingenuity behind creating such amazing objects- all made from natural materials in the environment. Being able to handle these objects was a real treat!

Kentan also brought along some rocks from a museum collection with some of these being hundreds and even thousands of years old!!! What a huge privilege it was to touch these artefacts and pass them around!

We also loved eating the scrumptious cookies baked by a local Elder from Bahtabah Land Council. We couldn't decide if the wattle seed or lemon myrtle biscuits were better!

It was fascinating going for a walk around our school grounds with Kentan. We learnt that our school has many plants which have traditional uses for bush tucker, bush medicine and making tools, weapons and shelters.

Check out some of the interesting things we learnt!



Swamp Lily

The white gel inside a swamp lily plant has traditionally been used to stop the sting of a jellyfish.

Dianella or Flax Lilly

The Dianella plant has a blueberry which you can eat. It also makes for a pretty impressive whistle.





Lomandra

This one plant can have 6-7 uses! Traditionally, women would use it to weave and make dilly bags and baskets. The white part of the stem is like starch and would be good to help you feel full. You can cut it up and fry like spring onions! There is also a white grain that forms as part of the plant that would be ground up to make bread.

Gum Tree

These leaves are traditionally used for smoking ceremony. There is a part of the sap which clumps together, can be eaten and is known as a 'snotty gobble'.





Banksia Serrata (Coastal Banksia)

Aboriginal peoples knew that when this tree starts flowering, it means the salmon is on and ready for fishing. The men then knew to collect shells to make fish hooks.

Paper Bark


Because the bark is extremely waterproof, this tree is traditionally used to make a humpy or Indigenous tent. It is also ideal for bandages and known as an important medicine tree. The paperbark is also great to wrap food in to cook to give it a nice smoky flavour.



Make these delicious pikelets to pack in the lunchbox or enjoy for breakfast or afternoon tea.

Prep & cook time: 15 minutes, Freezer Friendly

Ingredients

- 1 over ripe banana, mashed
- 1 cup wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1 egg.
- 3/4 cup milk.
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence (optional)
- olive oil spray



Method

- 1. Sift flour into a bowl.
- 2. Add egg and milk and whisk until batter is smooth.
- Add mashed banana and stir to combine.
- 4. Heat non-stick frypan on medium heat and lightly spray with olive oil.
- Place heaped tablespoons of batter in the pan and cook for 2 to 3 minutes or until bubbles appear on the surface of each pikelet.
- 6. Gently flip and cook for another 1 to 2 minutes or until golden brown.
- Place pikelets on a plate lined with kitchen paper and continue to cook until no batter remains.

Background: Many different types of hide-and-seek games were played in Australia and the Torres Strait Islands. A game played in one part of Victoria in the latter part of the 1800s was called brajerack (the wild man). It was essentially a game of hide and seek whereby a player would hide in a wombat hole and would need to be dug out of this hiding place.

Short description: A simple game of hide and seek, suitable for younger children.



Players: Groups of four or more players

Plavina area: A designated area suitable to the activity

Game play and basic rules

- The brajerack hides in the playing area and the other players attempt to find him or her.
- Change around after the brajerack has been caught.

Variations

- Have a number of brajeracks. After three are caught a new game begins.
- Play at night using torches.
- The brajerack hides somewhere in a hall or designated area and the finders only have 60 seconds to find him or her.
